

Review of Russian Energy Policy and Interaction with OPEC (Emphasizing the Years 2000 to 2018)

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The increasing use of energy in the contemporary international system has made it more important for countries other than Russia to supply oil resources such as Russia, along with supplying countries with energy. Given the importance of the OPEC organization, it is struggling to make the first issue in international energy equities by establishing interactive relationships with large independent oil producers, especially Russia. On the other hand, Russia has tried to take advantage of this position, given its high contribution to oil production and supply. Looking at Russia's energy strategy for 2035 and understanding the developments in the energy market, it is clear that the country's stabilization and high oil prices are one of the primary strategies of the country. Meanwhile, it uses energy as a tool of political diplomacy to restore its hegemony and credibility internationally. The change in the behavior of Russia and OPEC in recent years and the establishment of interactive energy diplomacy is due to a change in attitudes between these two generations and a major supplier of energy. Hence, the thesis seeks to find the answer to the main question of the research: "What is Russia's energy contribution to OPEC over the period 2000-2018, and what has affected the pattern of engagement with OPEC?"
